Press Here	Herve Tullet		<p>Press the yellow dot on the cover of this interactive children's book, follow the instructions within, and embark upon a magical journey!</p>




The Very Hungry Caterpillar	Eric Carle		A beautifully illustrated story of a caterpillar eating his way through the book.




Eventually Ruby recognises that another child is equally troubled and finds that sharing her Worry can make it disappear.</p>
Dear Zoo	Rod Campbell		<p>A child writes to the zoo to ask for a pet and is sent all sorts of unsuitable animals until finally a 'perfect' puppy arrives. A lift-the-flap book which presents the reader with a guessing game. Clues are provided by a glimpse of part of each animal, by the adjectives used to describe them, and by the packaging in which they come.</p>
Ten in the Bed	Penny Dale		<p>The traditional rhyme, except that each of the ten that falls out of bed is a cuddly toy. When they have all fallen out the child in the bed is cold, so they jump back in again. The gently humorous night-time pictures give a renewed charm to this well-known 'counting down' rhyme.</p>
Walking through the Jungle	Julie Lacombe		<p>A small child walks, creeps, runs, leaps, swings and, finally, wades through the jungle - hearing animal noises as he goes - in this traditional, everybody-join-in rhyme.</p>
